DEATH OF SERGT. "NIBBY" RAYMOND, D.C.M.—Much sympathy will be expressed with Mr. George Raymond in the loss he has sustained by the death of his brother, Sergt. Henry Brynmore (Nibby) Raymond, D.C.M., R.F.A., who passed away on October 28th, in a Casualty Clearing Station in France from the effects of influenza. Sergt. Raymond was home on leave just prior to his death, returning to France on 17th October. Four days later he wrote to his brother that he had rejoined his unit, and was feeling very fit, with the exception of a cold. On November 1st, however, an intimation came by wire from headquarters that he was dangerously ill in a Casualty Clearing Station, and later news that he died there from influenza on 28th October. The gallant sergeant, who joined up in September, 1914, had been on active service since March, 1915, both in France and in Italy. During the whole of that period he fought continuously and was never once sick. He was on one occasion wounded in the head from a shell, but that did not prove serious, and he remained at duty. He was awarded the D.C.M. in 1916.
